Defra Guidance & Data Reforms: Costs, Benefits and Early Feedback Smarter Environmental Regulation Review

I am writing to invite views on the Defra Guidance and Data Reforms: Consultation Impact Assessment. This document may be found on the <u>gov.uk</u> website.

As part of the Red Tape Challenge, Defra committed itself to a fundamental overhaul of its guidance and information requests to make them simpler, quicker and clearer to use. A <u>survey</u> asking for views about what could be improved across different environmental topics was run from May to July 2013. A series of planned reforms was developed and published as part of the <u>Smarter Environmental Regulation Review: Phase 1</u> report on Defra guidance and information obligations.

This impact assessment covers reform of all guidance produced by Defra, Environment Agency, Natural England, the Animal and Plant Health Agency (APHA), the Rural Payments Agency (RPA), Marine Management Organisation (MMO), the Centre for Environment, Fisheries and Aquaculture Science (CEFAS), the Veterinary Medicines Directorate (VMD) and the Forestry Commission.

The scope of the smarter data reforms encompasses all information requests on businesses and others to provide information to Defra and its agencies. Information requests include:

- Permitting and registering activities;
- Monitoring or reporting on compliance or performance; and
- Making other applications for any other government schemes.

Information that businesses are required to hold but not submit are not included. The organisations covered by the reforms include Defra, the Environment Agency, Natural England, APHA, MMO, RPA, VMD, the Forestry Commission and local authorities (on Defra's behalf). It also includes information requests on carbon emissions to the Department for Energy and Climate Change (DECC).



The majority of Defra guidance and data reforms described in the consultation impact assessment have now been implemented. As this is the second consultation on this topic and the reforms have already taken place, a consultation period of 8 weeks was considered appropriate. The primary purpose of this consultation is to gain further evidence and test the assumptions made on the consultation Impact Assessment. Defra also welcomes suggestions from stakeholder for additional sources of evidence. Questions regarding the assumptions used in developing the estimates of costs and benefits resulting from these reforms can be found in Part B of the consultation survey.

Defra would also like to invite feedback from stakeholders on their recent experience of using Defra guidance and reporting information to Defra and its agencies. These questions can be found in Part C and Part D of the consultation survey.
