Natural England has now decided how to proceed following its review of the longterm directions to restrict open access rights on this land. A consultation was held between 07<sup>th</sup> and 30<sup>th</sup> July with statutory consultees. We received responses from several consultees including; The British Association for Shooting and Conservation, County Durham Local Access Forum and Natural England's own responsible officers.

All feedback received was in support of the directions continuing.

In addition, Natural England's responsible officers made the following observations,

*'although the numbers of black grouse have increased, they are still vulnerable to poor breeding years which can severely impact the population. Their breeding range is still so restricted I feel that the restrictions are likely to be justified for some time'* 

and;

'black grouse remain present in all 3 areas, albeit the population is still highly volatile. There seems to be no indication that black grouse can break out of the 'boom and bust' cycle that prevents numbers getting to a point where a wider colonisation of suitable sites occurs- for example a permanent westward expansion into the Howgills, or recolonisation into the east side of the Lake District. Hence, on that basis I would approve on-going restrictions for winter dog access on these sites, as any help the population gets is welcome!'

## Outcome of the review:

Natural England's decision is to leave the original directions unchanged in the way they were originally proposed and extend the end dates for a further six years.

There is still an ongoing need to provide protection to the Black Grouse population from disturbance for the foreseeable future.

Further to that, the monitoring programme commissioned by Natural England and being conducted by the Game and Conservation Wildlife Trust which concludes in Spring 2022 will provide more substantial data relating the Black Grouse population trends in the locations covered by the directions.

Natural England's policy for long-term directions is that they should not be given for a period of more than six years. Therefore, the directions will be extended until 31<sup>st</sup> August 2027. With respect to directions at Widdybank Fell and Hole Head & Guy's Moss, the end date will remain 30<sup>th</sup> June 2065.

Where a direction restricts access indefinitely, for more than five years, for part of every year, or for part of at least six consecutive years, we have a statutory duty to review it within five years of the date of its issue.
