Natural England has now decided how to proceed following its review of the above mentioned long-term direction to restrict open rights on this land. A consultation has been held between 12<sup>th</sup> February and 20<sup>th</sup> march 2020 with statutory consultees and the general public. We received the following comments

We accept the need for the restriction to continue at Sandy Point

### Outcome of the review:

Natural England's decision is to leave the original direction unchanged in the way it was originally proposed and extend the end date for a further six years

Sandy Point is considered to be one of the most important beach, dune and dune-heath complex in Hampshire. These habitats are vulnerable to trampling and evidence of its impacts can be seen within the immediate area outside of Sandy Point LNR. Any increase in access levels to the site is likely to have a negative effect upon these habitats. The site also has a diverse community of lichen species present which are also likely to be negatively affected by an increase in visitor pressure.

Any easing of access restrictions will increase the level of disturbance to bird species that are present on the site. Species such as the Dartford Warbler who breed on the site are particularly vulnerable to disturbance from people and dogs.

Currently access to the site is controlled by permit only although guided walks are available to the public every month. The site covers 17.5 ha and is particularly vulnerable to increased trampling due to the presence of several fragile habitats. The restrictions in public access are likely to have ensured that this site maintains its high ecological value.

Natural England's policy for long term directions is that they should not be given for a period of more than 6 years. Therefore the original direction will be extended to an end date of 30<sup>th</sup> December 2026.
